https://webcollect.org.uk/cmyc/category/junior-helm-week). The cost will be £60, the same as last year. You can book either mornings (10:00 to 12:30) or afternoons (13:30 to 16:00), but not both. A member of your family who is not a member in their own right and is not covered by family membership may only be booked onto the waiting list. Oppies (for those 6 to 10 years old) will use club boats. Toppers (for those 10 to 15 years old) should use their own boat if they have one, club boats will be available for those who don't have their own.

The great egg boat race will be held during the Friday lunch break, more details nearer the time.

Portsmouth & Solent Cruise Reports

On Saturday 14th June we made our annual pilgrimage to Portsmouth Harbour. We had just two boats. I was with Steve Grey in his Miracle and Brian Dart had his nephew aboard his Versa. Dave Monk had hoped to join us but found himself short of crew. The winds were 4-5 NE and they turned out to be very gusty indeed. We launched from Hardway SC and sailed up to Fareham. Here we were made very welcome at the Fareham Motor Boat and Yacht Club we were holding their annual Regatta. We enjoyed a convivial pint while watching their rowing gigs racing.

Normally we would have sailed across to Porchester but that would have meant a dead run on the leg back to Hardway. We decided to cut our losses and head directly back. We planed most of the way!

The Round Hayling Island Cruise planned for 5th July fell victim to the weather. The forecast was for F5-7 with driving, clearly not suitable conditions for the event.

The first Solent Cruise took place on Saturday, 19th July. There was an amber warning for thunderstorms but the winds were forecast SW F2-4. I met with Mike Smith and we towed the Ribcraft down to Hillhead in torrential rain. As we arrived the clouds began to lift and the rain stopped. Three dinghies took part. Ian Michel and Kathy Lugt in their Comet Versa, Dave Monk and Duncan Newell also in a Versa and Steve Grey single-handed in his Miracle. Originally I had planned to go East with the tide until I looked at the details and realised that the tide would still be east going mid to late afternoon. Better to go west against the tide and come back with wind and tide assisting us. We would aim for Gurnard, west of Cowes. We launched from the beach and initially our progress was very slow. The wind was light and on the nose and the Solent tide against us. We could see a fleet of racing yachts off Osborne Bay clearly getting ready for a start. We were clearly in good company as it was the first race of the international Admirals Cup.

I was busy calculating time and distance to Gurnard and considering alternative stops, Calshot or Lepe beach. I grouped the boats together as we approached the main shipping channel and we waited for a container ship and a couple of ferries to pass. It looked clear so we started to cross. I then realised that a Tanker had just left Fawley oil terminal and was heading our way down channel. Dave and Duncan had clearly not been to Specsavers and seemed oblivious. Mike had the RIB up to full throttle to head them off from crossing any further. Probably best not to anger a Sea God. The ship was the Sten Triton bound for Antwerp.

Having crossed the channel we made our way past Calshot and towards Lepe. The sea breeze had increased the wind significantly and the sun shone, Steve and Dave were now heading fast across the Solent for Gurnard. Ian and Kathy were dropping behind and mindful of the time we

towed them across till they were just over one mile off. I cautioned them about the strong tide and went to check on the progress of the lead boats. Having satisfied ourselves that they were on course for Gurnard we returned to Ian and Kathy. They had been caught unawares by the tide and swept East, past Egypt point and towards Cowes. We again provided a tow back up to Gurnard. It was a late and rushed lunch ashore as by now it was now nearly three.

The return leg was very fast. The three boats planed back across the Solent in what was now SW5. Steve felt overpowered sailing single-handed in the Miracle so he dropped his main and continued under jib alone, a wise and seaman-like decision.

He was still making 5kn S.O.G! The leg back to Hillhead was without incident though both Versas felt unstable and overpowered sailing on a fast run with a quartering sea.

The Solent Cruise is by its nature more of a challenge than our usual sailing. We were all tired but felt a sense of achievement having visited the "South Island"




HOLIDAY SEASON

AM sailors can use the same boat they used in their morning session.

PM sailors – if you want to race, indicate this when booking and a boat can be saved for you.

Be ready to go on the water by 12.35 so we can finish on time for the PM sailing session.

<u>Sign on</u> – Outside the clubhouse there will be a signing on sheet to put your name on – please make sure it is clear – if you are unsure about the other things to complete there will be someone there to help you.

<u>Briefing:</u> Before the race the Race Officer will explain where the race will be and the marks to go around. They will also explain how you will know when the race is about to start and

stop.

At **12.35 - Head out to the starting area** by the Maid of Kent. Looking forward to seeing you at the August & September 'Fun Race' and it would be great to see some new Topper and Oppie sailors having a go, along with some Fevas and Laser 4.7's

Unfortunately we woke to a mill pond and no wind. There was a lot of waiting around and racing was finally abandoned in the afternoon. Social sailing was offered so everyone launched for a quick (slow) sail

Tuesday we had much better conditions. Rookies got 5 races in. The Ilca fleet had a race abandoned due to protest. The handicap fleet got 3 races in. All our sailors did us proud and seemed to be doing well. Unfortunately there was a delay and issues with the results but the whole team was patient and understanding.

On Wednesday we had 3 teams entered for the Mount Haes, sailing Fireflies. Oliver G and Seb sailed first and managed 4th (returning a boat with a snapped shroud before the race even started). Seven members including two youngsters attended the Racing Rules session. The session was based on the scenarios presented on the Finckh website. We started off looking at committee boat end starts, running a sequence for a particular scenario, discussing which boat might be penalized, then entering our answer. We were then able to see if we were correct or not and look at the explanation of the situation and the rules that applied. We moved on through various other start scenarios before taking a break. After the break we covered some windward mark situations and realised that unless you have a very good grasp of the rules you could easily be in trouble if approaching on Port tack within the three boat length zone if boats are approaching on Starboard tack. We finished off with some leeward mark and penalty turn examples. Thanks to all those who attended for joining in the discussions, I think we all learned something useful.

Rapid Races



West Sussex 2025 Regatta

This year should be a great event, especially as some of you raced at Itchenor when the regatta was there two years ago. Although Itchenor SC is within Chichester Harbour it is a good place to experience tidal sailing. I am delighted to say that we have already had entries for the Rookie Fleet and we are hopeful a few more having taken part in the Fun Race, Topper coaching sessions, or recently completed their RYA Stage 1 & 2 will decide to come along and join in. It is a great introduction and ideal preparation for next year to go to the week long NSSA Regatta.

They often organise coaching sessions for the Rookies at these events and the support boats covering the Rookie Fleet do give help and coaching on the water during the races.

The event is open to sailors who are under the age of 19 years on the 31st August 2025, sailing monohull and non-foiling dinghies. All boats shall be identifiable by their sail number and logo.

Competitors shall enter as teams that are managed by an adult Team Manager. (Team Managers shall have authority to act in loco parentis during the regatta and will ensure competitors are aware of, and have read, all other associated documents.)

As Cobnor Activity Centre is a short sail across to Itchenor SC we have decided it would be easier to sail, or tow, the dinghies across from Cobnor to the sailing club, as we will have the club rib with us to ensure a safe crossing.

We have made a provisional booking with Cobnor to stay on the Saturday night (20th September) inside one of the residential buildings. The cost for this is £25 per person. This will mean we can use their showers etc. We will also be able to leave the trailers there from Saturday until the dinghies come back on the Sunday afternoon - so everything will be that much easier, especially being able to avoid loading/unloading in the road outside Itchenor SC.

Usually on the Saturday evening we order fish & chips (or similar) from a local shop but the sailors will need something for breakfast on Sunday morning. We will then sail across to Itchenor SC. Launching should be fairly straightforward but quite congested, so we need to be organised.

Any parents who are able to tow please let me know, so we can utilise the club's trailers to share towing. We would appreciate a few parents being willing to stay overnight to keep within the ratio of sailors per adult; also to help transport the sailors bags from Cobnor to Itchenor and back after racing finishes.

Parents staying overnight at Cobnor will need a current DBS
