Strictly Come Dinghy Cruising

The Chichester Harbour Cruise on Saturday 11th was pure magic. Just two boats took part, but we had a lovely cruise to the Royal Oak at Langstone Bridge taking full advantage the afternoon high tide for a leisurely pint alongside. We had bright sunshine and a gentle sea breeze. A solitary seal popped its head up to see what we were up to in the Emsworth Channel on the way back.

I was slightly concerned that the light and variable forecast for 18th might mean no wind. I had billed this one as a cruise suited to new cruisers and slower boats, complete with powerboat support. I now keep my Victoria 16 in the Cobnor dinghy park where I was joined by Maciej, Celina and Szymon. We hoisted sail and crossed to Itchenor to meet the others.

We had 4 dinghies in all, Ian and Kathy in a Comet Versa,

Sara in a lovely traditional Wagtail dinghy and Kevin and Jim in Kevin's shiny new Wanderer. We also had powerboat support with Neil and Andy accompanying us in the RIB. Celina joined Sara in the Wagtail and Maciej and Szymon crewed for me. I held a quick briefing on the hard and buddied the boats into pairs. Though the winds were light 2-3 and somewhat variable we sailed rapidly down to East Head on the ebb. We had an early picnic lunch, and the sun came out. We debated where to go next, and the consensus was to sail up the Emsworth channel to see the harbour seals who like to bask on the mud at low water. We had Spitfires flying overhead and the wind held. There were seals on both sides of the channel.

We then turned around and headed back with a brief stop at Hayling Island SC where there was a large RS Feva and RS Tera event. The sail back was uneventful

and relaxing, and we congregated on Itchenor hard and all were agreed it had been a most enjoyable day. I would like to say big thank you to Neil and Andy for looking after us in the RIB. I am aware that it is a long all-day duty. Thanks again. I then made my way back across to Cobnor with Maciej, Celina and Szymon. We visited the Old House at Home, at Chidham before heading back home.

Recumbent Sailing

You may have seen recumbent cyclist, but have you seen or tried recumbent sailing?

Our Commodore, Richard, has arranged the loan of two such boats, a doublehanded Hansa 303 and a single-handed Hansa 2.3, to allow the club to explore the possibilities that these may offer.

These boats are like mini yachts, they have a weighted keel, hence you can sit in the boat in a recumbent position. The keels are part lead filled and part water – they fill and empty as you lower and raise the them, cunning! However, the 303 still requires the use of a removable hoist to raise and lower the keel, the keels remain in the boats when ashore.

One key rule is that no-one should be in the boat when the keel is not down. At 40kg for the 303 once down it stays down!



Unfortunately, although we were able to sail from the jetty we didn't get far before grounding.







Recumbent Sailing

Alan towed us to deeper water, where we were able to have a laidback leisurely sail, the wind was too light to judge how the boat feels as it starts to heel over.

Steering is via a joystick, point it in the direction you want to go, that's a bit confusing, albeit logical. Sails can be reefed from the seated position.





The single handed 2.3 is a bit different, it has a keel that can be raised a little, but still must remain down, whilst afloat. Hopefully, this will allow it to be sailed from the jetties. Lack of wind dampened our enthusiasm for a trial sail.

These two boats will be available for members to try at various times, most notably at the Carnival social on the 8th June. Now, you may think "I'm not going in that", but why not, especially if you have mobility problems. Is it better to be out on the water, in a boat that may look a bit odd, or sit on the shore watching others enjoying sailing. Don't be too proud, give it a go! However, I won't be selling my Comet just yet, but who knows what the future holds.

Powerboat Level 2

Sunday 21st and Sunday 28th April saw the first of this year's Power Boat Level 2 course. Six candidates attended the two-day course, three youngsters, under 18, and three older candidates. The weather could have been kinder, but the rain more or less held off, with just a short shower as we got the boats out on day two and again after we packed away. All six candidates passed the course without any problems, so we have six additional Level 2 qualified power boat helms.

If you would like to do the Power Boat Level 2 course, we will be running another course later in the year on Saturday 28th Sept and Sunday 6th Oct. There is a waiting list on WebCollect and currently there are only four on the list, so there are spaces available

All Powerboat helms – Please read

Over the years we have had to increase the amount of equipment carried on the powerboats. The old First Aid kits used in the lake boats have been replaced by a new yellow Flambeau box. Each box contains: fire extinguisher, vacuum sealed first aid kit, resealable bag of plasters, rescue knife, spare kill cord and a copy of the emergency action plan. For the small RIBs, please leave the boxes closed in the RIBs. For the Rigiflex, please leave the boxes closed and with their engines.



The two centre console RIBs now have vacuum sealed First Aid kits and a resealable bag of plasters in yellow cylinders, these are to be left in the RIBs. Fire extinguishers are kept in the large tubs.

Please notify the Training Principal if you open the sealed first aid kit or note anything missing.

Note from Alan C: When storing the powerboats please leave the fuel tank vents open, closing the vents can cause the tank to collapse as it cools. This is what happened recently:





Also, he would appreciate it if anchors and warps were left tidy so that he can access the tanks to refuel without having to sort these out to get to the retaining straps.

- 1. <u>Find a boat</u> If you are using a club boat please ask an instructor to allocate you with one or rig your own ready for **12.30**.
- 2. <u>Sign on</u> add your name, class of boat, and sail number plus which sail size to the signing-on sheet in the clubhouse as soon as you arrive.
- 3. <u>Briefing 12.30pm</u> changed and ready for the briefing in front of the clubhouse.
- 4. Launch after the briefing head out to the sailing area by the Maid of Kent.

We will start the race at **13.00**, so sailors need to be near the MOK about five minutes before that to hear the count down to the start.
