

Poll Results – Duties

The October Members Poll about duties has sparked some interest.

The question was: Should there be a wider range of duties available?



A significant proportion were unsure and without any supporting comments we are not sure why they are unsure, perhaps just not wanting to capsize the apple cart?

Just over a quarter of the respondents were clear with a 'No' response but without any additional comments, however those that responded 'Yes' provided some interesting views including:

- Catering duties (or at least supporting the supply of drinks from the galley).
- I feel there should be less race duties and more social sailing duties.
- Alternatives to race duties for families with children that then need to arrange childcare.
- The number of duty people who turn out does not reflect the number of sailors benefiting.
- The popular events e.g., Saturday Sessions do not appear to have official duty support.
- Smaller tasks like sweeping jetties and getting boats out where everyone chips in should not become duties but kitchen at Saturday sessions, running the second-hand stall, or managing the kit distribution could be. These could also be rolled into a couple of larger official duties along with power boat helm / crew and give structured support and take some of the pressure off the brilliant team that run Saturday sessions and helm week etc.
- Some non-water based duties for those that bring our kids to sail could be of use.

This has provoked some discussion, and we are grateful for your feedback, after all it is your Club.

The ultimate solution might be where we never have to assign duties at all, with everyone volunteering some time, but until then please help in any way you can – stick around, have a chat, pitch in, enjoy a cuppa, and join an organised event like the Hedgecourt Heroes (03 and 17 November) advertised elsewhere in this newsletter.



Topper 2 AM – Report by Amy

The aim of this month's session was to become confident in rigging a topper and sailing a beam reach. To begin with we be paired our new sailors up with some experienced helms, who did a great job at showing our new sailors how to rig a topper. After a quick tacking refresher, we headed out on the water where did some follow the leader. The wind was coming from a tricky direction with some strong gusts but all sailors managed to sail around a shallow triangle course. As everyone had become more confident in sailing across the wind, we played a team ball game to finish the session. Great session from all and thanks to all the parents who helped get the toppers out.

Topper 1 PM – Report by Rebecca

We started the session on shore with a chat about wind direction and awareness. We then discussed the port and starboard rule. On the water they sailed in a figure of 8 and applied the port and starboard rule, we continued to move the buoys closer together making the sailing area smaller. We pulled each topper out to do a come along side drill. We played it with a ball within a small area again reminding about Port and Starboard. Finally come requested capsize drill, those who didn't had to sail a tight circle around the powerboat.

Fevas PM - Report by Amy

The aim of this month's session was to practice our boat handling skills and MOB. After a quick briefing each Feva was allocated a buoy to practice MOB. After everyone had a few goes we practiced some boat handling skills by doing tight circles. We then joined up with the Advanced group to some quick thinking races his activity showed the group's competitive side as there was lots of rules being shouted. Well-done all and thanks to Martyn for driving the power boat.



2024 Flotilla Holiday

Although only three of the ten boats were from CMYC this year (whereas in the past we have made up the whole flotilla) it certainly didn't take anything away from what was a great week's holiday.



Starting at Plataria on the Greek mainland we sailed across to Petriti on Corfu for the first day's outing. The next morning, having bought some freshly landed sea bream from one of the local fishing boats, we set off for Lakka on the north tip of Paxos.

First of all though we went towards Syvota back on the mainland, anchored by a small beach, and after a swim, prepared our fresh fish on the boat, and cooked it for lunch, along with a Greek salad. Wonderful!

The rest of the week continued in a similar vein, visiting places such as Mongonissi, and Emerald Bay on Anti Paxos, with plenty of decent sailing accompanying lunch stops at anchor, and some lovely food each evening in the tavernas at the ports. We even had to 'honeycomb' one night in a busy port, which was great fun.

A highlight towards the end of the week was being overtaken by a famous local boat, the Black Pearl. It's a 106 metre sailing boat (our yacht was 38 feet...!). Quite a sight.



Another excellent flotilla organised through the club, and a big thank you to everyone that went, you all made it very special.

West Sussex Regatta at Shoreham SC



The entrance gate to Shoreham SC was one of the most unusual and eyecatching we had seen.

Finally, I am able to give you a few more details of the WSSYSA Regatta held at Shoreham SC in late September.

There were a few mishaps along the way, but it eventually turned out to be a great event.

The most significant one involved Mike Smith's campervan deciding to break

down on Friday halfway to the venue. After a flurry of emails and calls a member from Shoreham drove up to meet Mike and towed the club rib down to Shoreham and prepared it ready for the next day's racing. Pleased to confirm Mike returned home safely and came down by car next day to helm our powerboat, along with Celina as his crew. The whole Shoreham and WSSYSA organising team were helpful in every way over the weekend and made us all feel very welcome.

Michael and I were camped not far from the sailing club and arrived early on the Saturday to ensure we were there to register the team and help our team get ready for the racing. During this time the 'heavens opened' too quickly for us to put on wet weather gear and therefore we got very, very wet! Luckily the sailors were undaunted and soon afloat having a great three hours of racing. After racing there was a coaching session before they could go home to dry out ready for the Sunday racing, having secured some good results all-round the CMYC team were keen to get going the next day.



When we arrived early next morning there was already a lot of discussion between the organisers, safety-crews and team managers as to whether racing could go ahead due to a dire forecast which included heavy rain, lightening and strong winds. In the end it was decided that the Rookie Fleet should stay ashore. A sad decision but it enabled the other fleets to go out with sufficient safety cover. During the discussion the sailors had taken the opportunity to take advantage of the bacon rolls to

give them additional energy.

It was decided that all racing should finish by 12.00 as there was to be a lot of shipping movement in the harbour during the afternoon and this proved to be the right decision when we all saw just how huge these vessels were. Although there were some capsizes most of the fleet returned happy and with no breakages.

West Sussex Regatta at Shoreham SC

The wind and waves did increase and the Rookie Fleet all seemed glad they had stayed safely ashore.

All 128 sailors received a medal and certificate for participating and overall our team were 4th out of 10. Only the top five results from each team are added together to find who is the top Team. We had nine boats and eleven sailors in our team, and if you look at the results you will see several teams had between twenty to thirty sailors. So our sailors really did amazingly well, especially the Rookies who only did one day of racing.

WSSYSA Regatta – Official Write-up

128 entrants compete at 30th West Sussex Schools and Youth Sailing Association Regatta

The 30th Annual Regatta organised by West Sussex Schools and Youth Sailing Association (WSSYSA) and hosted by Shoreham Sailing Club attracted 128 entrants from 10 clubs/schools/ associations from across the county. (The following was written by Roger Belton and appears in the RYA London & South East October newsletter).



It was wonderful to see so many young people having fun and enjoying a sport they love. There was a lot to for the safety teams to consider with a number of ship movements, yacht traffic, a big spring tide and changing weather.

Saturday racing:

After comprehensive race and safety briefings, and a sudden deluge of almost biblical proportions, the racers were

launched under the watchful eyes of the crews of 12 safety boats. In near perfect conditions of good breezes and gentle swell the Fast and Medium Fleets packed in three races while the Slow Fleet and Rookies completed just two.

At the end of the first day the clear leaders were Sebastian Gatton from Crawley Mariners YC in a Topper sailing in the Slow Fleet, with Jack Gardner and George Long from Bishop Luffa School in an RS Feva XL in the Medium Handicap fleet, feeling very pleased with three bullets.

In this fleet Crawley Mariners came 4th (Charlotte Fagg & Esther Armstrong) and 5th (Thomas Irvine & Liam Taylor).



Sunday racing:

In the morning the Race Officers, Safety Officer, Event Director & Deputy Event Director were in deep consultation around a forecast of lightning and a strengthening wind, neither of which materialised, but in deference to the skill of the sailors a decision was made to rest the Rookie Fleet, who had a great time on the beach instead. Despite a rapid launch and transit to

the race area, the race starts were

delayed by the sailors being far more interested in watching a passing pod of dolphins than getting on with the far more important business of racing!

So who finished where?

When racing was done, Jack and George continued with a perfect score, and Sebastian (Crawley Mariner YC) did more than enough to secure his regatta win.

WSSYSA Regatta – Official Write-up

In the Fast Fleet things were tight at the top with just two points separating the first four racers. Sebastian's brother Oliver took top slot in his ILCA 6, closely followed by Josie Kelly of Felpham SC in her ILCA 4, with Fin Geri (also Felpham) ILCA 6 and Matthew Board of Bishop Luffa School also in an ILCA 6, both on equal points.

For the Rookies, Harry Farrands of Dell Quay SC in a Pico took first place. Just two points behind and tied on points were Freddie Pearson, also in a Dell Quay Pico, and Isla Cookson and Alfred Brosnan sailing a Feva for Adur SC.

The much coveted and sought after Team Trophy was awarded to an ecstatic Worthing SC team after many years of Felpham dominance.

Post race coaching

Jack Miller provided excellent after-racing coaching using video footage recorded during racing.

Thank you to: This event can only happen with the generous support of a huge number of volunteers bringing participants, dinghies and safety boats to the host club, and a massive thanks for a huge effort by the Shoreham team who made it an excellent weekend to remember.

The stats:

- 99 dinghies entered from 10 clubs/schools/associations from across the county.
- 128 young people participated, 32 in two handed dinghies.
- 8 organisations/individuals brought RHIBs to help with safety and coaching, supplementing the Shoreham team.
- 19 different classes of dinghy were represented, from 29er to Optimist.
- Every participant was awarded a regatta medal and a certificate, and about 50 participants came away with a podium prize, or a spot prize.

Hidden behind the statistics is the fun that participants had with their friends. For many it was their first experience sailing in a big fleet, in a different location from their home club. Well done to those on the podium places, and an even bigger well done to those who had their first regatta experience this weekend.

Footnote from Steve Michell - (RYA Regional Manager London and South East) who dropped by on Saturday morning to lend his support to the event, and talk to parents and team managers. Steve said: "This was another well organised event by Shoreham Sailing Club and WSSYSA, bringing together a very impressive number of junior and youth sailors from Sussex sailing clubs and centres. A great response also from the network of clubs and centres who get behind this event and work tirelessly to support their sailors, many of whom are sailing away from their own club for the first time to join a team regatta."

Water Quality Results

Hedgecourt Lake is tested approximately every two weeks by a fully accredited water quality testing laboratory. In line with Environment Agency guidelines CMYC aims to test water quality about 20 times a year. Under the Bathing Water Regulations 2013 there are four categories of water quality for swimming:

EXCELLENT GOOD SUFFICIENT POOR

The bacterial standards are:

E.coli: less than 500 colony forming units per 100 ml of water = "EXCELLENT"; less than 1,000 = "GOOD"; .

Intestinal Enterococci (IE): less than 200 colony forming units per 100 ml of water = "EXCELLENT"; less than 400 cfu/100ml= "GOOD".
