

It was a very light wind session; the Feva group focused on improving their light wind sailing and learning how to set the boats up for the conditions. A few of the sailors also learnt how to use the spinnaker for the first time and managed to get some good runs with all sails up despite the very light winds.

We had enough instructors to have one to one coaching in most of the boats. Donal sailed with Franc in the Omega, Caroline with Will in the Miracle, Ian with Kirk in the Wanderer

Also AlanC accompanied Dani in the powerboat to allow her to build on the training she received on the PB2 course. There were some quite challenging gusts, which resulted in a couple of capsizes. Thanks to all the Instructors.





What a great weekend, good to be back at the Cobnor Activity Centre after a break of two years. Let's start with some comments received from the participants.

"Thanks to all for organising the great weekend, the girls concluded they would like to go every weekend." from Hal.

"This is the first time I have gone to Cobnor with Crawley Mariners. It was great fun to be with my friends and learn more about sailing bigger boats, like Quests and Wayfarers. The instructors were very helpful, kind and encouraging. We arrived on the Friday, had dinner and slept over. The catering was amazing all weekend. On the Saturday we had a fantastic breakfast and at nine we had the briefing and then we went to rig the boats. We had four Wayfarers and two club Quests.

In the Wayfarer I was sailing in there was one younger instructor, and two young sailors. It felt safer, than a Topper because you don't sit on the gunwale but on a seat inside the boat. The older instructors were in the two Quests because they had more experience with bigger boats. We switched round after lunch, so everybody could sail with as many people as possible. At the end of the day we de-rigged our boats, changed and went for a walk together along Cobnor point. It was fun to see where we had sailed but from the shore. We



walked back and had a fantastic dinner of mashed potatoes and sausages followed by lots of games together.

On Sunday we thought it might be too windy to sail but in the end there wasn't that much wind, just a drizzle of rain. I was very pleased to have a go in a Quest and I even got a chance to helm. We sailed up to Dell Quay where the members of the sailing club generously welcomed us in for a much needed hot chocolate. On the way back we used the Spinnaker, which was great fun. When we got back we had lunch and started to pack up. It was a great weekend and I would love to go next time." from Hugo.

I think Hugo has summed it up pretty well. We had four adult sailors and twelve juniors, some younger than we had taken before, but they coped well.



The forecast for Saturday was F4 gusting F5, so we reefed the Quests and put the storm sails on the Wayfarers. In the morning we headed up the Bosham Channel, making the most of the tide. There were some fairly challenging gusts, but every one coped OK. We watched a fleet of Oppies from Bosham training and gradually depleting as the strong wind took its toll, but they looked like they were having fun. In the afternoon, we had a very fast run down to East Head where we sailed around for a while, with one boat becoming a little



too familiar with the sand banks on the northern side. Heading back we had time to venture up the Thorney Channel, getting about half way before heading back to Cobnor for tea and cakes.

As Hugo mentioned, before dinner we walked to Cobnor Point, this gave our cooks a little peace and quiet whilst preparing dinner.



October 2025 - A Report from the "EU Delegation"

We met up with our fellow Mariners at Gatwick early on Sunday morning for our flight with Easy Jet to Preveza. There we were in turn met by representatives of Sailing Holidays before boarding a bus for a one-hour drive to the town of Sivota on Lefkas. Here we boarded our yacht "Ambrosia", a Beneteau Oceanis 35. Crawley Mariners had chartered four boats out of a total of eleven on the South Ionian flotilla.

I was sailing with Ursula and Christina, team Kestrini on our last flotilla. Christina was delighted with the space and layout of the more modern Beneteau 35 and the twin wheels were the icing on the cake. We met up with our lead crew, Will (skipper) Meg (hostie) and Huw (engineer) who were sailing on lead boat "Kamara" We paid a visit to the local mini-market to top up on essentials, Greek tomatoes, feta cheese, hummus and other delicacies for lunch stops. We signed various papers, had a boat briefing and then went to the local taverna for dinner.

The next day we motored from Sivota then up the channel between Meganissi and Lefkas. When the wind kicked in we sailed around the islands Skorpios and Skorpidi. The former was once belonged to Aristotle Onassis and Liz Taylor but Christina informed us it is now owned by some Russians. We moored up stern to at Spartahori (despite me initially confusing it with the next harbour, Little Vathi) We ate ashore in Steve's restaurant. The next day the winds were light and we motored across to Polis Bay on Ithaca. I practised my sextant noon sights on the way. At Polis Bay we had a lovely paddle board and swim stop and I enjoyed watching the myriad of fish around the boat while snorkelling. After lunch there was some wind so we sailed across to Kefalonia before beating up channel to Fiskardo. We were moored stern to on long lines which meant some ingenious dinghy work to get ashore. After a cocktail briefing in Theodoras bar we adjourned to Nicolas Taverna where we had been on a previous visit and we had a lovely traditional Greek meal while enjoying stunning views over the harbour. On the Wednesday we sailed around the North tip of Ithaca and moored up in Kioni for lunch and a swim stop. We then went back up to Frikes where the boats were rafted up. The forecast was for some wet and windy weather on the Friday so we used the Thursday to sail back north. We sailed all the way to the Meganissi channel where the winds were either light or sudden and katabatic* so we motored up the channel before entering the harbour at Nidri and berthing stern to on the Armonia pontoon.

The Friday was indeed wet and winy, we motored out to just north of Skorpidi where we hoisted sail with 2 reefs in jib and main. Despite the go faster lines and twin wheels the limitations of the boat soon became apparent when beating to windward in a F5. (Poor pointing ability and a lot of leeway) Having experienced some wet and windy sailing we motored into Little Vathi for another lovely evening in the taverna next the quay. On the Saturday the worst of the wind and rain had cleared so we motored down the East side of Meganissi before hoisting sail and sailing back to Sivota. There we had a group meal to celebrate the week in Delfinias taverna. Here the lead crew awarded arbitrary prizes to the various boats. We were dubbed the "EU Delegation" as we had one Irish, one Swiss and one true Greek aboard Ambrosia.

Here is the more detailed write-up for the WSSYSA Regatta which I promised in the last newsletter. Firstly 'even the best laid plan can go wrong' and we had our 'ups and downs' over the weekend - however; I hasten to say that there were definitely 'more ups than downs'.

We had a team of two lasers; two double handers and six Rookie Toppers booked on to sail in the CMYC team, but sadly the Friday before we left one of our Rookies (IIa) was very poorly and had to stay at home - really pleased to say that she recovered by the Cobnor

Weekend and was able to experience some really good sailing there.

After an early lunch on Friday, Mike and I called at the lake to pick up a double trailer with a Feva and Topper on. We had a good journey down and arrived to book in with Cobnor office and find out where they wanted us to park the three camper vans. Quite a bit later on Martyn arrived with the powerboat, along with Pier's and family (plus the large Topper trailer). They were held up leaving as there was a problem with the powerboat trailer hitch causing a much later departure than expected. Martyn then went to find out where he was to put the powerboat ready for use the next morning.



We had sufficient helpers to get all the boats unloaded and were able to get all the Toppers and Feva ready with the correct sails, spars etc. At this point the Gatton's arrived with their

All to bed early as we had an early start, needing to leave Cobnor by 7.45 to enable us time to tow the Topper sailors across to Itchenor SC by 8.30 in time for the safety-boat, team manager and sailors' briefings.



We were so glad the Toppers had practiced being towed at Saturday Club and it all went very smoothly, although for Martyn helming the powerboat and Will and I keeping an eye on the tow rope and sailors, it was a little nerve racking – but the sailors really enjoyed it.

I had spoken to the organisers the previous day and found they were short of coaches for the Rookie Fleet, so it was great that both Amy and Dan were able to come down and help as well, it certainly helped when we got to Itchenor and Dan was there waiting for us. By this time the parents left at Cobnor had driven around ready to help on shore with trollies etc.

The weather was good and a reasonable breeze enabled the racing to start on time. It was good having Martyn in the powerboat and Amy and Dan working with the Rookie fleet, as our Rookies had someone they knew there.

Overall, they managed to get in three or four races, which was just as well, as the wind and tide got stronger during the second day.

Martyn had some problems with the powerboat but managed to get it back to Cobnor that evening. Due to this we left the Toppers at Itchenor SC ready for the next day. A small ferry boat was organised to get the sailors back to Cobnor. Esther and Thomas were scheduled to do their 'DI Sailing Assessment' on the way back with Matt Wright observing them. To enable this to happen Liam went back in the Feva with Charlotte and Esther joined Thomas in the 2000. During their assessment on the way back to Cobnor they had a couple of exciting capsizes but after Matthew had accompanied them back to Cobnor, he told them they had passed their assessment and coped well with the conditions and had demonstrated a 'textbook' capsize drill.

When all safely back two of the parents organised the fish & chips and they arrived just as everyone had finished changing and were ready to eat. We all enjoyed the meal and had a relaxed social evening, before heading early to bed ready for another early start.

The next morning Martyn and Tom from Cobnor tried to get our powerboat working again, but this was not possible, and none of the Cobnor powerboats were available for us to hire.

So new plans had to be made. After an early morning distress call to WSSYSA Committee & Itchenor SC a small ferry was organised to collect our sailors, plus several adults to get the sailors back to the sailing club in time for the briefing and racing. Due to the increased wind and strong tide the Rookies only did one more race, but the Medium and Fast Fleet did a couple more. Whilst we were waiting for the Prize Giving to be set up we were able, with the Committee, sailing club and some of our parents, to organise getting our Toppers towed back to Cobnor. The Feva & 2000 sailors had sailed back with their boats and were able to get a lift back to the sailing club for the prizegiving.

We were aware that we had some good results from the first day, but did not know the final results, we realised these were good when Hugh and Caitlin received 1st & 2nd prize in the Rookies. This was followed by a surprised Charlotte & Esther with a prize in the Medium Fleet and then Olli was called up as 1st Fast Fleet and 1st overall sailor of the event.



We were really pleased. Szymon was also presented with the NSSA trophy as the highest placed West Sussex sailor at this year's event.

We were one of the smallest teams there, with both Felpham and Worthing having teams in double figures, so finding out we had finally won the Team Trophy was really amazing, as we had been 2nd and 3rd several times during the past 15 years.

Thanks to the parents who had organised the Ferry to collect the sailors and some parents from Itchenor to take them back to Cobnor, we were able to get the boats ready for towing, check we had left the Jubilee Room and kitchen clean and depart from Cobnor in reasonable time.

The journey home was free of heavy traffic, but it was dark by the time we got to Hedgecourt to leave the trailers there. As Liam's family had left first, we were surprised to find they were still there, but it transpired they had a puncture which delayed them. The rest of us arrived about ten minutes apart, which meant we were able to help each other get the boats each safely stowed and sails in the clubhouse. A long day, we arrived home about 9.30pm to have quick meal and go to bed. N.B. It was all worth it as it was a wonderful weekend, great company and excellent results.

It was sad that our powerboat decided that weekend to pack-up, but I have to say we received terrific support from all the clubs and committee involved with the event, and would not have been able to do it without them.

Mostly we compare notes, tweak our settings, practice our sailing and mark rounding and most importantly see who is the fastest on the water. It is very relaxing. We have a mixture of model yacht classes, these include. DF-65s, RG-65s, DF-95s, International One Metres (IOM) a Hurricane 1m, a Footy and a few older Marbleheads. All classes are welcome. Do come down and join in the fun.

I am very conscious that new formats and sailing times are needed to cater for a diverse membership. In particular we currently have two junior members and we hope to attract some more so we will look at school friendly sailing times.

Exciting News! We have just commenced our inaugural DF-65 and RG-65 combined racing series. This is for the new and prestigious "Autumn Tea Leaf Trophy" It is to be held over five Wednesdays with three races each day with a windward leeward course. Last week was plagued with almost non existent wind and Alan Carlile showed his dominance in these tricky conditions with three wins on day one. This may well change in more breezy conditions and there is all to play for.

We use a phone app called DSRC to time the starts and record the results. So far it seems to work very well. It can also be used for dinghy racing as it also covers the 5,4,1, Go sequence as well as PY handicaps. We also have our own blue and orange mark buoys for courses plus a very handy little rowing tender for laying the course and also to rescue any wayward models.


You cannot help being impressed, or can you?
